'Major changes likely by 2036'

Bhubaneswar: Odisha's child population will reduce from current 7.3% to 6.3 % by 2036 while the population of above 60-year-old persons will increase from the current 11.5% to 17% by 2036, according to data released at at Odisha Vikash Conclave-2023 here on Thursday.

Fertility rate is likely to drop from current 1.8 to 1.2 in 2036. The proportion of women in the reproductive age group is also expected to drop from 55% in 2021 to 51% in 2036. All these changes are expected to happen by 2036 when Odisha will celebrate

State faces decline in population growth, low fertility rate & rise in aging population

Decline in population growth rate, reduced fertility rate and rising aging population as well as the drop in outgoing migration were revealed by experts at a novel effort to address demographic challenges when the state celebrates its centenary of statehood in 2036.

The Centre for Youth and Social Development (CYSD) here on Thursday hosted the Odisha Vikash Conclave (OVC) on the theme "Transformative Odisha @2036: Demography and Development," where domain experts presented an insight to the changes and challenges ahead.

Professor Emeritus Amitabh Kundu highlighted that the population growth rate of Odisha, which was below 10% during the last decade (2011-2021), has consistently declined compared to the national level. Previously, Odisha's population, representing 4% of India's total, has now reduced to 3.5%, he added.

This apart in three districts - Rayagada, Nabarangpur and Kandhamal the demographic transition will be higher and is expected to exceed two indicating a significant regional inequality in demographic transition by 2036, Professor Amitabh Kundu pointed out.

Government policies and schemes need to be aligned to tackle the challenges posed by demographic transition, with a greater emphasis on social security support, he emphasized.

As the state's aging population is projected to reach

17% by 2036, the state has a unique opportunity to harness the potential arising from demographic transition, Jagadananda, Co-Founder and Mentor of CYSD pointed out.

"This dividend can be tapped in two ways: first, the Gender Dividend, which involves utilizing the untapped potential of the aging female population; and second, the Silver Dividend, which entails leveraging the knowledge and expertise of older individuals," he added.

Dr. R Balakrishnan, Chief Advisor (Special Initiatives) at the Office of the Chief Minister, maintained that the

Odisha budget outlay has leaped from Rs 1 crore in 1936 to Rs 2 lakh crore now, indicating steady economic progress in the state.

He underscored that Odisha's development model is equity-based and inclusive, striving to reach the last mile individuals.

Andrea Wojnar, Country Head of UNFPA, praised Odisha government for focusing on women as this is an untapped resource, she said.

The conclave also shed light on five critical areas of demographic transformation in Odisha. These areas include Aging Population, Migration

and Urbanization, School Education, Youth, Skilling, and Employment, and Health and Nutrition, each discussed in separate tracks.

The track Migration and Urbanisation highlighted Odisha's Migration Census stated that there are indications of a positive net migration rate of 0.74%, suggesting increased migration to Odisha.

The panel on School Education highlighted that as per population projection there would be fewer children (6-14 years old) but more young people (20 and above), so we need to carefully plan while opening new schools and invest more in higher education.

The Nutrition and Health track, found that the child population of Odisha is estimated to decrease from 9% in 2011 to 6% in 2036. The Infant Mortality Rate (IMR) of the state is anticipated to decrease to 20 by the end of the period 2031-35.

Among others, Dr. Nadeem Noor, State Head of UNFPA Odisha and Dr. Muniraju S.B, Deputy Advisor, NITI Aayog spoke at the conclave.

CHANGING DEMOGRAPHY

Need focus on higher education: Experts

THE share of children, aged 0-4, as well as school-going population, aged 5-14, in the state's demography will decline by 20 per cent by 2036 implying investment on childcare and school education needs to be more on quality than quantity, opined experts here on Thursday.

Speaking at the fourth edition of biennial Odisha Vikash Conclave (OVC) on the theme 'Transformative Odisha @2036: Demography and Development' organised by the Centre for Youth and Social Development (CYSD) experts said in Odisha, the population projection shows that there would be fewer kids up to the age group of 14 years, but more young people in the age group of 20 years and above in another one and half decade. Accordingly, the state needs to carefully plan while opening new schools and invest more in higher education.

The state needs to do this quickly to get the most benefit out of the changing population, they said. Apart from education, the conclave discussed five critical areas such as ageing population, migration and urbanisation, youth skilling and employment, and health and nutrition.

As per CYSD's findings, the state, currently home to 4.56 crore people, will add another 30 lakh people to its demography by 2036 and this changing demography will throw more challenges. The experts at the conclave pointed out that as per projections the population aged 60 and above in the state is set to surge from 3.9 million in 2011 to 8 million in 2036. As the state's ageing population is projected to reach 17 per cent by 2036, it has a unique opportunity to harness the potential arising from demographic transition, said Jagadananda, the co-founder of CYSD.

Deputy advisor at Niti Aayog Muniraju SB, chief advisor (Special Initiatives) at the office of the chief minister R Balakrishnan and country head of UNFPA Andrea Wonnar also spoke.

The conclave underscored the imperative for a

comprehensive database for panchayats, encompassing population data, ration card holders, and beneficiaries of government schemes.

The need to register all migrant labour, provide basic amenities and social security at workplaces was stressed. Formulation of a state policy on migration was another suggestion made at the conclave.

To ensure the effective implementation of health and nutrition schemes, experts have proposed the development of a village-level action and monitoring plan. They advocated for promoting nutrition supplements made from locally available fruits, roots, vegetables, and cereals.
